Sky Warn Very Radio Active by Donnie, W7XY

We have worked with the Weather Service for many years gathering information to prove their information. We always went out to the Weather Service and used their radios to gather the information. The area was in most cases from Hamilton to Kalispell and some from Idaho. We used two meters most of the time. Now there is HF, VHF and UHF plus APRS at the Weather Service. Once when a gear was stripped at Point 6 on the radar we furnished the only information for a while. Lewis Ball and I worked that date for them out at the station activating Sky Warn.

About two years ago Peter out at the Weather Service ask three of us to be able to log into the service of the Weather Service and join their chat rooms. When other people help us we do it from one of these stations so as not to plug up and cause problems with their service. A group of people logging in and out would really cause confusion and it is not needed. Have now found out that one station logged in seems to work best as they watch that station for reports. In most cases we run it from my station. At first I didn't really know what we where supposed to do and rounded up reports from the areas that they requested and had them call the reports into the local station. Then they hinted that I could put the information into their service as well as they could. So I started doing it and it has really been a real help to them. They advise me as to what areas they need information from and I start locating Hams in that area and getting reports and posting them. Then I found out that people from all over the country was watching the information I was posting and using it to form forecast for their area if information was there that they needed. It has really helped when the radar has been acting up or they are wanting to see if the weather is doing what it looks like on their screens. Hail reports and high wind really helps them to do aircraft warnings and etc. They also like damage reports. So if Sky Warn is activated then people are requested to go out to the Weather Station and use the equipment there and acquire the info they request. If they just want me to do it from home I log in and round up what I can using my equipment and the people I can contact. The problem is that if it happens during the work week then it is hard to find people to help. On holidays people seem a little sparse also. That not only pertains to local but people all over the area. So far this year I have gathered information for them bout 15 times of about eight hours shifts. One week I did it three times and this week looks like it will be 4 times.

In some cases they may want Sky Warn activated plus my home station going to activate reports out to the Weather Service and also posting reports from around the state. So far we have done it this way about three times since I set up my station to do this.

I enjoy doing it but am gone sometimes so Lewis Ball is working with me for a backup plan.
